Scope and purpose:

In the following pages we present various study tracts of Bible scriptures which we offer for use as a means of discipleship and to know God through Christ Jesus. In many of these tracts, you are presented with core truths from the Bible that God has revealed to us over time as a progression of Creation to Christ. We at AFM encourage the use of these learning tracts for group Bible study in a small setting like a home with 12 or fewer people so all can participate and learn the truths of God interactively and in community. We encourage you to do this weekly or more often as you are all able to meet. Our goal is to teach people how to hear God and obey him and to be accountable to one another.

In these Last Days, God has chosen to speak to us through his Son by the power of his Spirit to the willing and obedient listener to his written word, the Bible. So our prayer for all, the seeker or the saved, is for you to seek God in all honesty and openly. Pray first for him to open your own eyes to his truths about Jesus Christ and salvation, and then for your feet to follow and obey what God speaks. Knowledge of God is useless unless it is acted upon. The Bible tells us, faith without works is dead, so we want to teach simple Bible study methods that anyone can use to learn to hear, apply and obey God with their life. In doing so you will see just like the Psalmist declared in Ps 84:10 *“Better is one day in your courts than a thousand elsewhere; I would rather be a doorkeeper in the house of my God than dwell in the tents of the wicked.”* God bless you as you seek to lead or participate in this life-changing exercise of study with God’s holy inspired Bible sent to us through his Prophets.

Leaders Guide:

Anyone can facilitate and lead a DBS (Discovery Bible Study). Our hope and God's plan is for all of his people to be in community learning together how to follow him. To do this we must gather and not just be lectured, but be where we can read or listen to God's Word, and do so among community to ensure we are accountable and applying his truths to our lives. God does not want people who perform "religious rituals" but people who are becoming like him, to do justly, to love mercy and to walk humbly with our God. (Micah 6:8) To do that, we must learn what God says, his truths and his ways and learn ways to apply them to our own life, seeking his correction and direction. God holds us accountable if we do not tell our fellow man of the pure way of Christ, of his justice and mercy and help to lead them in the way of righteousness. (Ezk 3:18) So our goal here is to show a simple inexpensive way to do Bible Study in which we all can reproduce it and have our members go out and lead more groups, starting a movement of home Bible study groups to do our part in growing God's work around the earth.

- 1) **God our teacher:** God is jealous for our affections. He created each of us in love for himself, and for a real purpose. His desire is that we love him and come to him as our primary source of life and knowledge. Yes God gives some to be leaders and teachers and prophets and evangelists and as such we can learn more through their help, but all of God's teachers are supposed to teach you to depend on God and to learn from him directly, not depend on them. The Bible was written in common languages and was intended to be understood by the average person. God is not hiding necessary truths from us. Going to him through his Word is God's primary way of speaking to us today, so it is important to fight the urge towards idolatry and work to keep God first in all things, especially to whom we seek spiritual wisdom and guidance. Idolatry is when you or I put anything ahead of God in priority, anything I love by my actions or words more than God is idol worship. The prophet Isaiah spoke by God's Spirit, "All your children shall be taught by the LORD, and great shall be the peace of your children." (Isa 54:13) and Jesus the Messiah repeated this truth and revealed further that he is God's Word saying, "It is written in the Prophets, 'And they will all be taught by God.' Everyone who has heard and learned from the Father comes to me." (John 6:45). Jesus also said "But you are not to be called rabbi, for you have one teacher, and you are all brothers. And call no man your father on earth, for you have one Father, who is in heaven. Neither be called instructors, for you have one instructor, the Christ." (Matt 28:8-10) So as we learn together, some are more skilled than others in certain areas, and God wants us to work together as brothers and sisters in Christ to learn his Holy Word and to use what you know to benefit others, all with the purpose of keeping each of us focused on God, not on man and someone's interpretation. The Word of God has only one interpretation, and is not subject to anyone's private interpretation. (2 Peter 1:20-21) So, we all must learn to be good students of his Word, and how to read and hear the various forms of literature in the Bible and understand it in the context in which it was written, not pulled out of context to support some belief that you want to have. This is crucial and as we learn together in a community of people seeking God, we hold each other accountable to stay true to the Word of God and to correctly study and apply the truths therein. We are commanded in the Bible "Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who does not need to be ashamed and who correctly handles the word of truth." (2 Tim 2:15). So if you and I are serious about real relationship with God, we must walk in obedience and seek him. Those who seek him in truth will find him. That is a promise of God. Jeremiah 29:13 "You will seek me and find me, when you seek me with all your heart."
- 2) **How to see great numbers of people follow God:** We can read in Acts 19:1-10 that literally millions of people heard the Gospel in modern day Turkey through the apostle Paul and 12 disciples over a period of 2 years. Let's read it: "*Paul entered the synagogue and spoke boldly there for three months, arguing persuasively about the kingdom of God. But some of them became obstinate; they refused to believe and publicly maligned the Way. So Paul left them. He took the disciples with him and had discussions daily in the lecture hall of Tyrannus. this went on for two years, so that all the Jews and Greeks who lived in the province of Asia heard the word of the Lord.*" As a result many people came to faith and the church grew in large numbers. Common sense as well as the Bible tells us this: How can anyone know the truths of God, unless someone tells them? So the burden is on each followers of God to tell about Christ and God's plan of

salvation. This is our job from God. How was possible that so many people were reached with the good news of Jesus in all of Asia (as Turkey was referred to) in such a short period of time? Yes God was with them in the power of his Spirit, but all of Asia heard the Gospel in a day when no technology existed. Simple. They did not stop to erect and build buildings, (cathedrals, temples, or churches) and then call people to come to worship did they? No they got busy and used what facilities they could find to preach and teach the good news. Using existing synagogues until they were run off, then other public places to teach about Christ, and they did not do it weekly on Sunday morning either. They did it every day. So if we are serious about seeing God's kingdom come to pass, we must take our mission from a part time once a week thing to a daily ministry and not focus so much on construction of facilities. There is a time and place for that, but much less than we think. Plenty of places exist. Homes are everywhere. The early church met in homes mostly. Utilize the blessings you have and then trust God to provide any extra means. The amount of money invested in temporal things such as brick and mortar is excessive in the Churches of the world. We must learn to focus on the real Church, the people of God. And learn to teach them in ways that don't require tons of money and "Mega-Churches" with one teacher telling everyone what to believe. God has no Pope. We all are priests and saints before him, if we give our life to him. You and I go directly to God. Jesus has made the way. Speaking of every Believer, the apostle Peter wrote; *"But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light."* (1 Peter 2:9) Thus our goal of this form of group Bible study we call discipleship DBS is to equip all believers to study the Bible on regular basis among community and even daily in private life so they can know God and his Life in Christ and to be able to effectively show others the Way. You don't have to be an evangelist to lead people to Christ, just do Creation to Christ Bible study with them and let God teach them. After all that is our ultimate goal.

- 3) **Discipleship the way the Messiah taught:** A lot of people read the Bible and simply overlook things and don't apply it. I am guilty of that myself. We all are a work in progress if we are living for Jesus. But Jesus Christ left us a simple model on how to reach people for God. Jesus sent his disciples out to witness about the peace of God that has come, the Gospel. This is told in Luke 10:1-12. Let's read it now. *"After this the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them on ahead of him, two by two, into every town and place where he himself was about to go. 2 And he said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. 3 Go your way; behold, I am sending you out as lambs in the midst of wolves. 4 Carry no moneybag, no knapsack, no sandals, and greet no one on the road. 5 Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace be to this house!' 6 And if a son of peace is there, your peace will rest upon him. But if not, it will return to you. 7 And remain in the same house, eating and drinking what they provide, for the laborer deserves his wages. Do not go from house to house. 8 Whenever you enter a town and they receive you, eat what is set before you. 9 Heal the sick in it and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' 10 But whenever you enter a town and they do not receive you, go into its streets and say, 11 'Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet we wipe off against you. Nevertheless know this, that the kingdom of God has come near.' 12 I tell you, it will be more bearable on that day for Sodom than for that town."* Here we can see a few principles we must apply to our lives and our mission. Christ is sending us out into a dangerous world. Even so we are told to go and tell of the Gospel. While going about proclaiming peace and doing good, praying for healing for the sick, pray blessings on them to receive the good news. If a person and family is open to receive God's blessings, we are told to stay with them and disciple them. Times may vary, but this model is Christ's approach. Then when we find people resistant to the Gospel, take back your blessings, warn them of God's coming near and move on. God will deal with them in his own timing and way. But key here is looking for that person and family of peace. God wants us to teach others in community so they can support one another and grow as a new small group and church. A church in simplest terms is any regular meeting of believers. Jesus said, *"Where two or more are gathered together in my name, there I am in the midst of them."* (Matt 18:20) So however you feel led or gifted to go out doing good, do it in the name of the Lord. Do it daily all along the way, weather in work or school or special outreaches, always looking for the person to who our Father God is drawing, then don't be prideful or lazy, when you find that family, stay with them work with

them and disciple them in Christ according to his command. Then they will become productive growing faith-filled believers who help spread the good news! This tool of discipleship DBS is to be used to grow people in faith but also to reach those who have yet come to trust in Christ as Lord but want to follow God and his plan for their lives. So if they have made a decision to follow Christ or not, if they are willing to listen to what God has to say about things, take them through one of these tracts of study and pray God completes in them his work.

- 4) **Discovery Bible Study, how to do it:** The Discovery Bible Study (DBS) is an effective process for multiplying disciples who make disciples and has been used all over the world in many different people groups. If you are looking for a simple, transferable method that will lead to loving obedience and spiritual reproduction, I highly recommend you consider starting a Discovery Bible Study. Here is the simple outline of how to facilitate one.
- a) Start with a Person of Peace (Luke 10:6) - and his/her extended relational network (family or friends)
 - b) Seek to lead a person/family/group to discover God and His salvation.
 - c) The Scripture is the authority. Lead a simple inductive Bible Study each week. You are not there to teach, but to facilitate others learning directly from Scripture.

Group Interaction

- 1- Ask: *What are you thankful for this week?*
- 2- Ask: *What needs do you or others have?*
- 3- Ask: *How can we help meet the needs expressed?*

Accountability

- 1- Ask: *With whom did you share last week's lesson?*
- 2- Ask: *How did you apply what you learned last week?*

Bible Study

(If no copy of the Bible is available for you, download off the internet the portion of the Bible to be studied and print it out, many online Bibles are available)

- 1- **Read the Scripture Text**
- 2- **Let others take turns restating the Text. Until all the text is known and able to be told by each person.**
- 3- Ask: *What does this passage teach us about God?*
- 4- Ask: *If this is true, how would we have to obey?*
- 5- Ask: *With whom do you plan to share what you just learned?*

For pre-believers you will start with (Prophets tract) Creation and work through the Bible to Christ, focusing on the attributes of God. For new believers you will start with commands of Christ (Baptism tract).

The great thing about using the DBS is that it has a great "teaching to obey" mechanism. By asking each person how they intend to obey each week, and following up the next week by asking how they applied what they learned, you are reinforcing the importance of doing what the Bible says!

- Keep discussion focused on Scripture
- Don't introduce outside materials
- Everyone must answer what must change in their lives to obey
- Focus on specific action
- Everyone identifies someone who needs to hear what God has said to the group
- Keep it simple, practical and transferable

Story #9: *Cleansing through the shedding of blood*

Job 25:2-6. Verse 5 has a good question: How can man be holy and justified in God's presence?

Hebrews 9:22. This verse states that only through the shedding of blood can man be cleansed from his sins. Please note that God doesn't require good works for salvation. He requires the shedding of blood. Why blood?

Leviticus 17:11. The life is in the blood.

Now, review the following stories and give examples of the truth that only through the shedding of blood can man be cleansed from his sins.

Sacrifice for Atonement (Lev 4:29-31)

Adam and Eve (Genesis 3:21) (Note that God shed the blood of animals to make coverings for Adam and Eve.)

Noah (Genesis 8:18-20)

Abraham (Genesis 22:8-14)

Job (Job 1:4-5)

Moses (Exodus 12:21-23, 28-30)

David (1 Chronicles 21:18, 26)

Solomon (2 Chronicles 7:4-5)

In summary, we have observed that all the prophets offered sacrifices. They did so because they understood this spiritual law: without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness of sins.

Ask the participants:

- 1) Is blood important in our culture? Give examples.
- 2) In our culture, if someone from one village kills someone from another village, what will the people from the victim's village do to the other village?

Story #14 - Three responses to Jesus Christ

John 9:1-7, 17-34

Explain to the participants: We see three types of people in this story. We encounter the Pharisees (they couldn't deny that a miracle had taken place but they refused to believe in Jesus), the parents of the blind man (they knew a miracle had taken place but were afraid to confess Jesus publicly), and the blind man (he knew a miracle had taken place and he was courageous to confess Jesus publicly). Which person do you want to be?

Emphasize: God did not demand good works; He requires the shedding of blood for the forgiveness of sins.

Ask these questions:

- 1) Do you believe that Jesus Christ is the Word of God?
- 2) Do you believe that Jesus Christ lived a sinless life, that is, He never committed a single sin?
- 3) Do you believe that Jesus Christ died on a Cross, was buried, rose again on the third day, and ascended into heaven?
- 4) Do you believe that Jesus Christ shed His blood for you on a cross so that you could be cleansed from your sins?
- 5) Are you ready to confess your sins to Jesus and ask for His forgiveness?
- 6) Are you willing to receive Jesus as your Savior and obey Him as your King and Master?

The following prayer can be used to express the desires of a person ready to believe. Make sure to point out to the prospective believer that God sees the heart. He knows those who truly repent and He has harsh words for hypocrites.

If you answered "yes" to these questions, the following is a possible prayer of repentance:

Example prayer of repentance:

God of love, I confess that I am a sinner and that I deserve punishment for my sins. I believe all that it says in your Holy Book, the Bible, and that without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness of sins. I believe that Jesus Christ came from Heaven, lived on earth without committing a single sin, was the perfect Lamb of God, and shed His blood on a wooden cross. With my mouth I confess that Jesus Christ is my King, and with my heart I believe that God raised Him from the dead. I ask that You, Lord, forgive my sins--not because of any good deeds that I have done, but solely based on the shed blood of Jesus on the Cross. Lord, Most Merciful and Most Gracious, forgive my sins, and cleanse me from all unrighteousness. Save me and make me your child. By faith, I surrender my entire being to You as my Savior and King. I want to live now on to bring glory and honor to your name, Jesus Christ. Amen

John 1:12-13, **But to all who did receive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God, who were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God.**
